GPMGA's Next Meeting: June 14

Now that our Plant Sale is over, it's time to enjoy some field trips!

On June 14, the GPMGA's meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. with member Danielle Randles leading a tour of Paramount Schools of Excellence (PSOE) Farm, Brookside location. If time allows, members then will travel 5 minutes away to PSOE's Cottage Home location—where Danielle is the Farm Manager.



The Brookside location began as a round garden with a "slice of the pie" designated for each classroom teacher. Over the years, a storage shed was built which later became the chicken coop; the garden changed into a row-type layout with raised beds; a shipping container was brought in to use as a barn; and an outdoor classroom was constructed. In 2014, the school created Environmental Education Staff positions which led to the addition of beekeeping and a goat program. The STEAM program allows middle school students the opportunity to spend summers working on the farm.

The farm at Cottage Home began in 2021 with a goat program and a native rain garden built inside the production garden. This year will be the first year of fully planting the production garden.

Students interact with the farm on a daily basis at both locations as it is part of the playground and backyard spaces. Farm lessons happen throughout the school year based on ties to academic standards. Fun events like goat birthday parties are sprinkled into the year too.

Danielle completed her Master Gardener training in Spring 2022 while working as the Environmental Education Assistant at both PSOE Farm locations. Last fall, she became the Farm Manager at Cottage Home. At that location, there are 60+ raised beds planted with flowers and herbs and a dairy goat operation with cheesemaking. She lives in the Holy Cross neighborhood (just south of the school) and is a licensed engineer with a degree in Agricultural Engineering and a certificate in Urban Agriculture.



GP Conservatory' King's Crown

King's Crown (*Justicia Carnea*) is an upright, evergreen shrub, reaching between 3 to 7 feet tall, with large, 6-inch-long, dark green leaves.

The plant has upwardly facing plumes of tubular, slightly fragrant flower clusters and comes in rose-purple, red, yellow, orange, apricot or white. The blooms appear from early summer until fall—usually cycling through two to four major flowering periods during the year. The plant attracts hummingbirds and butterflies.



Wild Plant Culture: A Guide to Restoring Edible and Medicinal Native Plant Communities by Jared Rosenbaum

Integrating restoration practices, foraging, herbalism, rewilding and permaculture, Wild Plant *Culture* is a comprehensive guide to the ecologi- cuttur cal restoration of native edible and medicinal



plant communities in North America.

Blending science, practice and traditional knowledge, it makes bold connections that are actionable, innovative and ecologically imperative for repairing both degraded landscapes and man's broken cultural relationship with nature. The content includes:

- Understanding and engaging in mutually beneficial human-plant connections
- · Techniques for observing the land's existing and potential plant communities
- Baseline monitoring, site preparation, seeding, planting and maintaining restored areas
- Botanical fieldwork restoration stories and examples
- Detailed profiles of 209 native plants and their uses.

Both a practical guide and an evocative read that will transport the reader deep into the natural landscape, Wild Plant Culture is an essential toolkit for gardeners, farmers and ecological restoration practitioners.

Each year, the Marion County Fair works in partnership with the Marion



County 4-H program to create a venue where youth in Marion County who participate in 4-H can display their work and compete against others to earn trophies, ribbons and entries into the Indiana State Fair competitions. The fair provides a platform to display the work of these youth and helps them gain valuable experience in presentation skills and competitionbased learning opportunities.



The centerpiece of the Marion County Fair is its midway! With the urbanization of Marion County and Indianapolis, the farmland and livestock that used to reside in Marion county has dwindled. However, the midway continues to expand its thrilling experience through the work of North American Midway Entertainment, the world's largest traveling outdoor amusement park.

The Marion County Fair Grandstands—now called the Circle City Raceway–is home to the fair's horsepower-related events and the fair's special features, events, acts and/or performers.
