## GPMGA's Next Meeting: March 11

The Garfield Park Master Gardener Association will meet at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 11, at the Garfield Park Conservatory when we will learn about Indiana Phenology.

Discover how the timing of leaf-out, flowering and fruiting shapes nature and your garden. This program explores phenology—the science of nature's calendar—and how you can track seasonal changes and contribute to community science.



Phenology influences the abundance and distribution of organisms, ecosystem services, food webs, and global cycles of water and carbon. In turn, phenology may be altered by changes in temperature and precipitation.

Amanda Wanlass, Executive Director of Indiana Phenology and Herbarium Assistant at Butler University's Friesner Herbarium, will make the presentation. She holds Master's degrees in Environmental Science and Public Affairs from Indiana University, and is a certified local phenology leader.

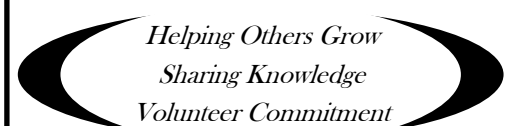

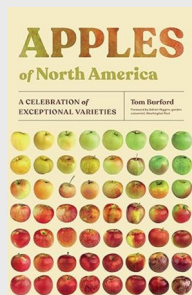


**From the Bookshelf . . .****Apples of North America: A Celebration of Exceptional Varieties**

The apple is one of the most iconic fruits, traditionally picked on cool fall days and used in pies, crisps, ciders and more. And, a vast world of varieties exists that go well beyond the common grocery store offerings. With names like American Beauty, Carter's Blue, Yellow Bellflower and Fallawater, and flavors ranging from sweet to tart, this treasure trove of unique apples is ripe for discovery.

Fifth-generation apple grower Tom Burford guides the reader through this tasty world in *Apples of North America*. The Burford family has grown apples in the Blue Ridge Mountains since 1715. This celebratory book is brimming with beautiful portraits of heirloom and modern apples of merit, each accompanied by distinguishing characteristics and common uses.

The reader will learn information on growing apples at home—with specifics on planting, pruning, grafting and more—and instructions on how to preserve apples through pressing, fermenting, cooking and drying. In *Apples of North America*, Burford specifies what has always been a mystery to some people—which varieties are best for baking, cider, applesauce or apple butter.

## Haan Museum Exhibition: *Rooted in ART*

The current exhibit at the Haan Museum of Indiana Art (920 State Street, Lafayette) is *Rooted in Art: Indiana Farms & Gardens from Pioneer Times to Today*.



Enjoy a veritable feast for the eyes and senses with this new exhibit featuring paintings, sculpture, ceramics and art glass - all that tell an unforgettable story of Indiana's agricultural history and the unique relationship Hoosiers have with the land they have called home since 1816.

Indiana is synonymous with farming and artists have documented the dramatic changes in the Indiana landscape over the last century. Visitors will experience artists' impressions of farm life over time, beginning with

Barton Hay's early painting of sheep in a pasture; moving forward to Harry Davis's 1937 painting of a farm dinner during harvest; and then to more contemporary farms. Visitors will discover old-fashioned barns, farm implements, pastures and activities such as haying in a wide variety of painting styles. Three-dimensional ceramics, art glass and sculpture round out the exhibit which nods nostalgic, while embracing the plenty and promise of the growing season.

The exhibit displays paintings near each other to contrast differences in agricultural life. In one room, a painting by Barton Stone depicts cattle grazing on a green pasture. The painting features dark green strokes in a dark color scheme, symbolizing a serene period in Indiana agriculture. The goal is to encapsulate the Indiana farmland. In doing so, it reveals the peace Indiana farmers had in the late 19th century.

By contrast, *Harvest Time* by William Kaeser is characterized by its bright color choice and a farmer shoveling the farm's hay with ease. On the right is also a woman in high heels pumping water from a well. The farmer and his wife convey strength and happiness, while the bright color palette conveys prosperity.
